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THE DOG DAYS OF SUMMER

The Dog Days of Summer derives its name from the fact that the hottest days of the year tend to coincide with the ascension of Sirius (the Dog Star) in the constellation Canis Major, interesting, but that is not why I brought it up.

For still water fishermen the dog days can make fishing doggone difficult. Higher water temps drive the fish in to deeper / colder water and make them less likely to feed when we diurnal creatures are more apt to be after them.

What's a fly fisherman to do you might ask? Well, you must adjust your tactics constantly to be a successful angler. That means rising early or staying up late to stalk your quarry when temperatures are cooler. Looking for those pockets of cold water in the lake where fish tend to take refuge from the *heat* of 70 degree water or searching out where streams enter the lake and where fish are likely to hold in the cooler current should create successful situations for you.

We know for certain the Dog Days will be upon us every year (it's nothing to get catty about), but that does not mean that we will end up with daphnia. (a beer to whoever figures that one our first)

May you have tight lines and copious fish!

CLUB OUTING THE SAN JOAQUIN

I wanted to thank everyone for coming out to San Joaquin Outing. Higher than expected water flows made the fishing tougher than usual at this time of year but those who put in the extra effort were rewarded with some feisty native trout! For me, fishing is always a puzzle to be deciphered, I like that.

Perhaps my experience can help you. I started fishing the upper section of the river with the standard Dry / Dropper set up but quickly abandoned that tactic as my dropper was being ignored and the Dry fly, although being attacked was receiving short strikes. A "short strike" is when the fly is struck by the trout but the trout, for whatever reason

missed the mark. Smaller fish are usually the culprit with short strikes. Sometimes downsizing the fly will produce hook ups.

After 15 minutes of dry / dropper I made the change to a double nymph rig under an indicator and my production, in both size and volume of fish increased immediately.

Casting a dry fly on a narrow, fast moving, brushy river will frustrate even the most seasoned angler - casting across current seams demands continual mending with more than likely short unproductive drifts. I try to work with what the river gives me - last weekend she was screaming indicator fishing!

Fishing the SJ was not as much about presenting a particular pattern, but more about making a presentation to the place the trout were swimming. My success was determined from reading the water then casting accurately. If you want a good book on the subject of reading a river then pick up "Prospecting for Trout" by Tom Rosenbauer.

Another tool I used to my advantage was my 10' 6" Cortland Nymph rod. The extra length on this rod allowed me to reach across multiple seams of current and pick apart my beat. I like to work upstream with about 12 feet of flat 5x. I try to hold as much of the line off the water as possible and gently steer the indicator where I believe the trout are holding.

I move the indicator for almost every seam. At times I will fish through a seam, hook several fish then change the indicator to reach other fish within that seam laying at a different depth. I like the ones with the tooth pick in them, they are easy to adjust quickly.

In the hands of an experienced angler a fly rod looks almost magical. It's not the easiest way to inconvenience a trout - but isn't that why we do it?

I propose to you that angling with a fly rod is a form of art that will demand from you years of practice, perhaps you will never reach the level of maestro but what a beautiful journey it will be.

Would you call this "structure" ?? Anyway, I thought I would give this spot a try. I had heard that damsel fly nymphs were working so I tied one on below a "Wood Chuck" fly.

Oh Yeah, make sure of your knots. Wouldn't you know it, after a few casts I hooked a nice fish and as I was getting it close to the boat it bolted, taking my flies with it! Bummer! OK, time to re-rig. Tied on another damsel nymph with a green fly below it. Wow! ! I was really tempted to keep this nice Cutthroat. Photo #2 (below).



Probably 22 - 23" and about 5 pounds. But, the fish gods convinced to released it. Another 10 casts and I had the one in photo 3 (above). Not quite as big, but a nice one. Now, lets put this in perspective. If I were fishing the Madison and hooked and brought a 14" trout to the net I would be really excited. But no, not at H Lake. Most anything under 18" is "small" ! I saw my friend Dave and texted him what I had caught the two on and, of course, that jinxed everything. Saw a couple really little ones follow my fly to the surface, but no more takes. I moved to the other side of the "structure" and caught two more, 18 - 20".

 I have put together the framework for a schedule of outings for the club and I would appreciate any feedback as I solidify the dates.


 If you know of a productive month to visit a certain destination then please let me know.

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






