

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE GARY SCOTT

### OCTOBER'S MESSAGE

#### ARE YOU LOOKING FOR A DEAL?

Then I have the answer for you. Come and join us for some great deals at our upcoming dinner and fundraiser on Wednesday night, October 13, 2021 from 6 PM till 9 PM. I know all of you are ready to get outside in search of that elusive trophy catch.

#### THE ROAD TO HEALING WITH A GOAL IN MIND.

It has been three months since my fall and injury to my leg while fishing on Bear Creek just off the JMT trial in the Sierras. While I'm progressing with my recovery (off of crutches, into PT, and gimping along) I'm remembering something I left behind on that journey. There was one particular trout that I left behind, unable to coerce into a catch. It was large in comparison to the rest of the fish we were catching (8-10" range) maybe in the 16" range. It was obvious the fish was of that size while nestled in a holding spot below a shadowy crag of rocks above.

"I was at least 50-60 ft away and on a high overlook of the stream below."

#### A CHALLENGE WAS IN STORE . . .

as I watched this fish working the feeding lane of the current below. I looked behind me for any obstructions to my cast and then the placement of the fly drifting easily across the fish's vision and the transitional seam of the shadow below the rocks. I had one chance to entice this fish for a bite of my flying ant pattern or so I thought. The cast was off the mark and the fly drifted almost 2-3 ft. away past the fish. Ok, no hook felt by the fish.

#### ONE MORE CHANCE FOR THE CHALLENGE.

I reloaded quickly and casted closer to the rocky crag in order to drift the fly into the inside current line and well ahead of the trout's lie. The trout had full vision of the fly drift and moved in for the take. In my mind a had this fish as I watched the fish grab the fly. My enthusiasm got the best of me as I lifted too quickly in order to set the hook watching the fish retreat and my fly depart in the distance.

"I said a few words to myself, which I will not repeat."

#### NOW WHAT DO I DO???

I was not giving up on this fish as it was still feeding aggressively. So, I changed my rigging and tied on a dropper fly (the Purple Midge) about 18" below my dry fly. I repositioned my stance and re-casted to the inside seam only to watch my fly rig drift past the fish untouched with little to no movement. Two more casts and nothing. Ok, I changed my rig once again and re-tied a Bead Head-Flashback Pheasant Tail.

"This time I will be ready for the take (in my mind). "

One more cast in the perfect spot and I watched the fly drifting toward the fish. I could see the fish turn its head and move on the fly. Again, I moved to set the hook on the dropper fly only to see the fish spook and my rig drift by without any success. After twenty minutes of working this one trout I realized I had worn out my welcome and moved downstream looking for another fishy spot.

"I long for that feeling of anticipation and energy tugging on my fly line once again."

I hope that we can share similar experiences of our adventures and learn from each other's mistakes in order to do what it takes to catch that elusive fish.

There is a bright spot - I learned more about Corbina than I would have, had the fishing been easier.

#### HERE'S A FEW TRUTHS I HAVE COME TO REALIZE:

- 1. Beach shape / slope is more important than tide.
- 2. Sharp hooks are critical.
- 3. There is no poetry in spinning gear and bait.
- 4. The ladies mostly talk, the gentlemen mostly listen.
- 5. Presentation is more important than pattern.
- 6. People arrive at the beach to shed their problems.
- 6. A low rod tip is a far more advantageous when using a barbless hook.
- 8. A high fish count does not equate to a successful season.

#### CALIFORNIA HIGH SCHOOLERS RESCUE 4,000 ENDANGERED SALMON




The students at Casa Grande High School in Petaluma, California, have stepped up to save endangered coho salmon.

In 1993, the school built a large hatchery on campus, where students typically raise steelhead trout. Because of California's drought, the water became too warm for 4,000 endangered coho salmon at a Lake Sonoma hatchery, and they were moved to Casa Grande, where the tanks can be kept at an optimal temperature for the fish.

Manfred Kittel of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife told The San Francisco Chronicle he was impressed by the quality of the program and "professionalism" of science teacher Dan Hubacker, who oversees the hatchery, and his students. Before students are allowed to participate in the program, they must take a conservation and biology class and pass two safety tests. It's a full-time job taking care of the fish, with students coming in on the weekends to feed them.

This is the first time Casa Grande has had the chance to rescue an endangered species, and the students are up for the challenge. "We have this opportunity to save coho salmon, to see that we can do it, if people put their minds to it," Kate Carlson, 17, told the Chronicle.

#### HOT CREEK EXPLORATORY DRILLING GETS GREEN LIGHT

On September 27, LeeAnn Murphy, Acting Mammoth District Ranger for the U.S. Forest Service, approved the request of KORE Mining Ltd. to permit exploratory drilling in its Long Valley Project area, part of which is less than a mile from Hot Creek Ranch.

The exploratory drilling that has been approved includes the construction of 14 concrete pads in the area, each 53 ft. by 30 ft in size – over 1,500 sq. ft. EACH - with 0.32 miles of ten-ft. wide "temporary" access roads built to provide access. Shrubs and plants will be removed and land leveled for the pads and roads.

While the proposal regularly speaks of minimizing the impact of the exploration, it is far from clear just how much land will be leveled, shrubs and plants destroyed, for the roads and pads. There will be substantial noise, potentially dust (despite "plans" to "minimize" the same), and long-term damage to the environment.

Significant water will be required for the drilling, during a time of extreme drought in California, and various hazardous materials and toxic substances will be used (as indicated in the Exploration Plan), which could pollute the ground water in the area.

KORE previously indicated on its website that KORE then would propose to use open pit and leach mining to extract the gold.

Despite all of the above, Ms. Murphy has approved the exploratory drilling. Her written decision emphasizes post-project restoration and rehabilitation, and that the application was for mineral exploration only, with no proposed mining "proposed or considered at this time."


Of course, why would KORE spend substantial sums for exploratory drilling if it did not have plans to extract the gold if sufficient gold is indicated?

The obvious answer is that KORE will seek to operate an open pit mine near Hot Creek Ranch if sufficient gold is found. And, since it will have been authorized to explore for the gold at substantial cost, there may be greater pressure to approve such mining. #### **Q&AS OF CASTING**

#### **SEPTEMBER'S CASTING QUESTION:**

There are many different fly lines available today. RIO alone makes (at my last count) 57 different freshwater fly lines and 33 different saltwater lines, not counting their spey lines. And then there are Orvis, AirFlo, Scientific Anglers, Cortland, Snowbee, etc. Can you describe three different types of "line tapers" and how they affect your fly casting?

#### ANSWER: Three different types of line tapers could include:

- > Weight Forward Taper(WF), where the first 30 feet or so of line are heavier than the rest of the line (which is referred to as the running line), giving you extra heft in the front part of the line, which makes it easier to cast distances
- > Double Taper(DT), where the middle section of the line is the widest and tapers to a narrower section of line in the first 15 to 20 feet or so, and also tapers the exact same way in the last 15-20 feet, so that you have a line that can be reversed if the front part wears out.
- > Level Taper (LT), where the fly line is a consistent diameter and weight along its entire length. There are more options than these, of course.

#### **OCTOBER'S CASTING QUESTION:**

There is one relatively simple thing that you can do that will result in greater distance, less effort, and overall smoother casting and better line control every time you go out. 







Rexall Weather Chart Calendar for 1939











California will now issue 365-day fishing licenses, under a new law signed by Gov. Gavin Newsom. Previously, the state issued a calendar-based license that expired on Dec. 31, regardless of when it was issued.

Assembly Bill 817, authored by Assemblyman Jim Wood, D-Santa Rosa, also authorizes the California Department of Fish and Wildlife to allow for sport fishing licenses to be displayed electronically on a mobile device

The new law seeks to reverse a trend that has found California annual resident sport fishing license sales down 55% since 1980, despite the state's population growth by 60% in that same period, according to Wood's office.

## CALIFORNIA STATEWIDE FIRE SUMMARY SEPTEMBER 26, 2021

More than 10,200 firefighters remain on the frontlines of 11 major wildfires and one extended attack wildfire in California. Yesterday, firefighters also responded to 11 initial attack wildfires across the state. Since the beginning of the year, there have been 7,686 wildfires that have burned more than 2.4 million acres in California. In comparison, during the same time last year, there were 8,420 fires, which burned more than 3.7 million acres.



#### SMITH RIVER NOW HAS A FISHERY MONITORING PROGRAM

It is with great pride I report to you that after 4 years of effort we have achieved what once seemed to be impossible - a continuously run fishery monitoring plan for the Smith River, with a focus on sonar counting both Chinook salmon & Steelhead.

As most know, the Smith is the last remaining anadromous fish river in California that is free flowing from source to sea. It is also the crown jewel of steelhead, with the California State record for size.

It measured 42" X 23", which calculates to somewhere between 29 & 32 pounds. At record weighting it topped the scale at more than 27 pounds. | READ MORE
